

Active Playtimes Purchase of new playtime equipment and storage to make breaktimes and lunchtimes more active. This year, Sports Leaders chose an exciting range of new play equipment suitable for the youngest to oldest children. A new trolley was also purchased to improve storage of the equipment. Basketball hoop 		 Children are expected to be more motivated to play with the new equipment and to be active once the equipment is in full use Improved storage has made equipment easier to access so that it can be out on the playground for longer periods. This again will help to improve children's activity levels. 	
ActiveMe Passports To provide one class with ActiveMe Passports to encourage children to be active both within and outside school.	WSSP provided an ActiveMe Passport for one class of 30 children. This was given to the children in Y3. The passport contained a range of challenges for children to complete such as walk or cycle to school at least 20 times. On completion of a set number of challenges children, were rewarded with a prize. Prizes included skipping ropes and balls to encourage still further activity. The pass port was introduced within a PSHE unit on being and staying healthy.	WSSP part of their provision (£6,750)	 Children were enthusiastic to complete the challenges and to record in their passport. The prizes provided a clear incentive. Some children lost their passports and wanted replacement. It was impossible to verify children's recording in the passports. 	WSSP supplied the passports as part of their overall provision this year. The cost of purchasing passports and prizes for further classes is too expensive to continue. Instead teachers will be encouraged to keep a wallchart of challenges for children to tick as they complete. Golden points and/or Certificates will replace the prizes for successful completion of challenges.
